




^ This chart shows the number of male/female reporters recorded across each format

OF THE PEOPLE DIRECTLY QUOTED, ONLY **24% WERE FEMALE**







BLATANT STEREOTYPE



- Large image from Ann Summers photoshoot on page 3 of Irish Daily Mirror. It is rare to see group of eight women on news pages, so unfortunate it is in this context.
- Although the photograph is racially diverse and has mix of body shapes, it reinforces sexualised narratives and **blatant stereotypes** around young women's bodies.
- Crucially, though, the issue is not with this photograph alone, but what surrounds it. The image appears in the midst of mostly "serious" male heads on the rest of the pages 2-5 in the newspaper: 7 other men are photographed (6 in suits) and just 1 other professional woman on those four pages.




TV segment part of "Covid-19: Road to Recovery" on RTÉ, based on three females: two women recovering from virus and one physiotherapist.

- The two patients are in domestic settings at home, talking about struggles like walking to the postbox. The other professional is in a caring/helping role.
- Again, context is key: these contributions are really valuable, but the tone of this piece is very different to the other Covid stories in the bulletin focusing on the primarily male political actors and health officials. This story, therefore, makes a more **subtle stereotype**, as it may reinforce the gentler/caring/homemaker/fragile stereotypical image of women, in contrast to the plentiful male decision-makers in the political arenas.





- News report on a new study that finds women who attend private hospitals are three times more likely than public patients to have elective Caesareans.
- One human source included: a male professor from UCD. By relying on a singular elite male source, the journalist misses an opportunity to include female narratives. Written by male journalist, this further limits the report to male voices, and overall the subject matter is stripped of women's perspective despite them being the focus, thus suggesting the story is **"gender blind"**.
- The professor's final comments are also noteworthy, "There is a big difference in the Caesarean rate ... [but] the issue is more complex than it is sometimes portrayed, and people should not apply simplistic, ideological arguments in relation to it." His opinion is a just one opinion, though. Rubbishing ideological arguments can dismiss the socio-economic factors that weigh on expectant mothers in terms of access and advice.



GENDER AWARE

- This radio segment on RTÉ radio looked at CSO figures showing a general decline in crimes reported during the initial Covid-19 lockdown (March-lune 2020).
- It was covered in most outlets throughout the day but this RTÉ segment highlighted some female-focused data. Thefts, burglaries, robberies, and assaults were down overall, according to the CSO, but the reporter did highlight the increased attacks on women aged 30-44 and over 60. He also referenced increased Garda attention on domestic violence and elder abuse.
- Although it was a male presenter and male reporter, it demonstrated **gender-awareness** in highlighting the risks facing women in the home during Covid-19 lockdowns and drawing attention to a problem which could have been overlooked in this data. Most other outlets stuck with a positive narrative of "crime has fallen as people spend more time at home due to Covid-19".
